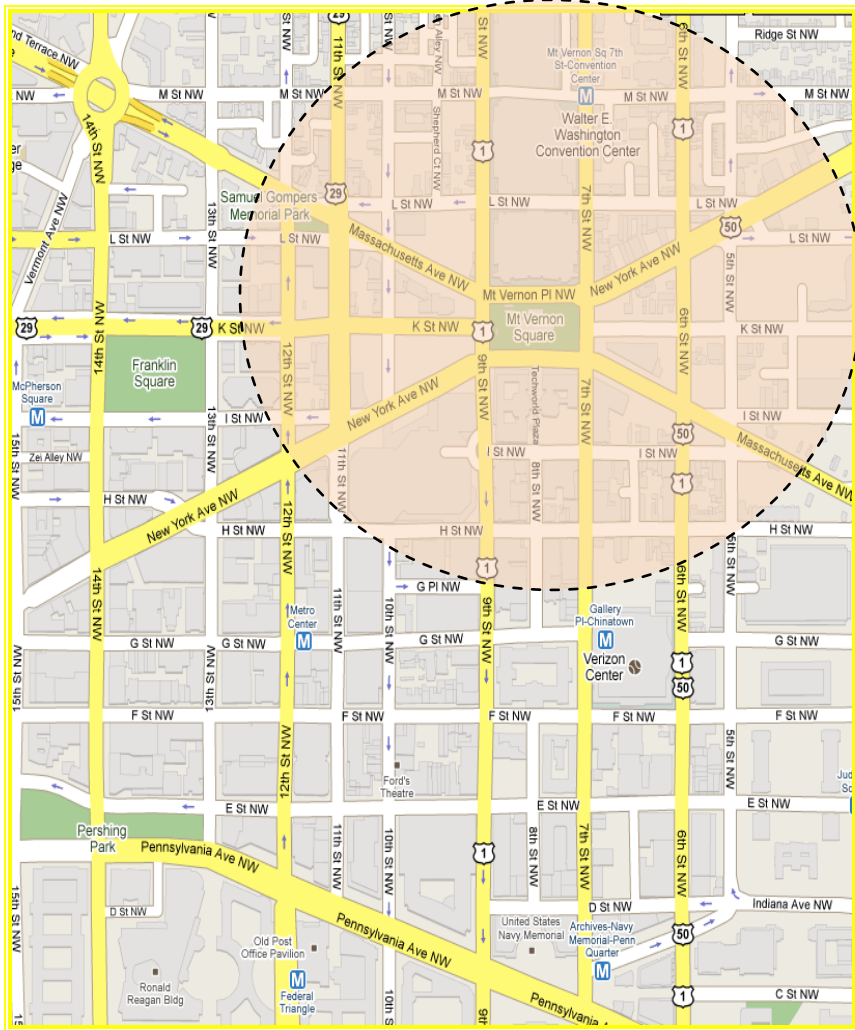


CONVENTION CENTER AREA MAP

THE RESTAURANT GUIDE

This restaurant guide provides brief descriptions for a selection of restaurants in Washington, D.C. In addition to the descriptions of the restaurants, we have attempted to personalize the guide by occasionally including comments from your fellow law librarians who live and work in the Washington, D.C. area. These comments reflect each reviewer's personal choice of restaurant, and serve to highlight some of the more popular restaurants among the local law library community. Please note that the focus of this guide is on eating establishments located within an easy walk of the Convention Center.

For those of you who want to explore the city, we have also provided examples of select restaurants in a number of D.C.'s more popular neighborhoods. Although there are many very good restaurants in nearby Virginia and Maryland, we have limited the scope of the guide to restaurants located within the District of Columbia. Obviously, this cannot be a comprehensive guide to all the restaurants in Washington, D.C., so we have also listed a number of professional restaurant guides compiled by The Washington Post, The Washingtonian, and many others.

Please note that we are not responsible for the quality of food or service you might receive at any of the restaurants listed. Many of the restaurants listed are very popular with tourists and locals and they can fill up very quickly. When possible, we suggest that you make a reservation ahead of time. SHORT WALK FROM THE CONVENTION CENTER

The area most immediately around the Convention Center may be referred to in guides as Chinatown, Gallery Place, Penn Quarter, or even Downtown, depending upon the guide. This can be confusing to visitors, so we have attempted to group those restaurants based upon their walking distance from the Convention Center. Listed below are restaurants that can likely be reached within a 15-minute walk.

Located just a short walk southwest of the Convention Center, Acadiana is a "contemporary interpretation of a Louisiana fish house." The various ethnic cuisines of Louisiana are well- represented on the diverse menu, and the restaurant's stylish decor offers an inviting location in which to sample them. In addition to their regular hours, they offer brunch on Sundays 11-2:30, and a Crawfish Broil on Fridays 4-6:30pm.
